

Academic Integrity Agreement

Please <u>Read</u> the Academic Integrity Agreement, <u>sign</u>, and <u>return</u> one sheet to Mrs. Giusti. Keep a copy in your notebook.

Violations to Academic Integrity Include:

- <u>Plagiarism: (Actions of a single person):</u> the practice of taking someone else's work or ideas and passing them off as one's own.
 - Why people do it? Because they didn't manage their time wisely and they think that "no one will know." I love a good bit of detective work and I will find out. Usually involves cutting and pasting from the internet.
 - <u>Consequences:</u> I may give you a chance to re-do the assignment with a significant penalty or it could be as severe as a zero on the assignment and a conference with your parent(s). It depends.
 - <u>How to avoid it:</u> be aware of due dates, know what your "crazy days" are and schedule time to do you assignments in small bits during the week. Make use of the Plagiarism Checker on my website check your work.
- <u>Copying: (Actions of 2-4 Persons):</u> the practice of handing in exact, or near exact, duplicate work. OR The practice changing a word or two on an assignment that you forgot to complete and you convinced a friend into letting you "see what they wrote."
 - Why people do it? Often mistaken for "working together" in which two or more parties state that they "did the assignment together." If that is the case, your sentences should be unique to each person. Use your OWN words.
 - <u>Consequences:</u> I usually put "See Me" on the top of the page and we shall have a conversation to determine the consequences. If you become a repeat offender.... Zero, for all parties involved.
 - <u>How to avoid it:</u> Be a good friend if someone asks you for your work DON'T DO IT! Help your friend avoid the uncomfortable feel of having to say no Instead TALK about the assignment. SEE How to avoid Plagiarism.
- <u>Sharing: (Actions of 5 or more persons):</u> Posting completed assignments on social media or through the internet prior to handing in completed work for credit.
 - Why people do it? (1) You think you are helping (2) to get more than 100 likes (3) You are showing off (4) You don't think anyone will actually download it and hand it in with their name on it. (5) a million other reasons.
 - Consequences: Zeros for all involved, including the original poster. No exceptions!
- <u>How to avoid it:</u> Resist the temptation and think, why should someone else get credit for my work? <u>Encouraging Academic Integrity</u>
- <u>Collaboration:</u> the practice of discussion and debate to work towards understanding OR each party is responsible for a portion of a group assignment. You'll learn how this works during your Elbow Chats and in your Core Groups.

- Why people do it? Because it's awesome! Nothing helps you better understand material that a nice conversation. You listen to how other people view the question and shape your own responses.
- <u>Consequences:</u> You and your peers create your own interpretation of the material that is unique to you!
